Review:

- 5. In verse 6, "robbery to be equal with God" means clinging to the privileges of divinity. Why is it so surprising that Jesus refused to cling to such rights?
- 6. What things did Jesus do to give up His divine rights and privileges in verse 7?
- 7. What things did Jesus do to give up His divine rights and privileges in verse 8?
- 8. According to verse 9, what is the result of Jesus' humility? How does this fulfill Jesus' words in Matthew 20:26?
- 9. How does Jesus' humility lead to unity among people in verses 10 and 11? What will all people do as a result of Jesus' humility?

- 2. What has helped you to cultivate the mind of Christ in your thoughts and feelings?
