# Be on the Alert Matthew 24:29-44

#### Review:

- 1. No one knows the day or the hour, so it is impossible to determine exactly when Jesus is coming from the signs He mentions
- 2. Jesus' coming will be sudden and unexpected, destroying the world as in the days of Noah
- 3. We must be on the alert, for all the signs of His coming have already been fulfilled

#### Reflect:

1. How does the certainty of Christ's return challenge your priorities? What changes in your life do you need to make to be ready for His return?

### Go further: Read I Thessalonians 4:13-5:11

- 1. In 4:14, what two things does Paul say that he and his readers all believe? What third thing does he say must also be true?
- 2. In 4:16, what three signs does Paul say will mark the return of Christ? Who will rise into the air to meet Him first?
- 3. According to 4:17, who will join the risen saints? Where does he say they will meet the Lord? How long will all the saints be with the Lord?
- 4. What does Paul have no need to write about in 5:1?
- 5. In 5:2, what does Paul say his readers know about the time of Christ's return?
- 6. According to 5:3, how will people be describing the times when Christ returns? To what does Paul compare the suddenness of Christ's return?
- 7. Because his readers are not in darkness, how does Paul say they will not react to the Day of Christ's coming?
- 8. Of what two things does Paul say his readers are sons? What do you think this means?
- 9. Given what Paul has taught about the return of Christ up to this point, what does 5:6 say his readers should not do? What two things should they do instead?
- 10. What two things does Paul say people do at night?
- 11. According to 5:8, with what two things does Paul want his readers to dress themselves?
- 12. According to 5:9, what does God not want to happen to Paul's readers? What is God's intention for them instead?
- 13. In 5:10, what does Paul remind his readers that Christ did for them? How does Paul want them to live in response?
- 14. According to 5:11, how does Paul want his readers to treat each other?

## Summary and Application:

- 1. In 5:6 and 5:8, Paul encourages his readers to be sober. Peter and Paul both use this word in a figurative sense, meaning to be self-controlled, to show sound judgment, and to be clear-headed. How can you put this principle into practice in your life?
- 2. If you knew tomorrow would be the last day before the coming of Christ, what would you plan to do? What is stopping you from doing those things?
