II Samuel 23:1-7

Review:

- 1. All who wield authority must have an attitude of humility toward God and other people
- 2. All who wield authority must seek guidance from the Word of God, the Holy Scriptures
- 3. All who wield authority must rule in righteousness, putting the principles of God's will into practice
- 4. Righteous governments bring light and life to their people, while wicked ones bring only despair

Reflect:

- 1. What kinds of leaders do you find attractive? Given what you've learned in today's passage, are all of them really worthy of your admiration?
- 2. In what areas of life are you called to lead? How can you put David's principles of good government into practice in those situations?

Go Further: Read Psalm 11

- 1. According to verse 1, in Whom does David find refuge?
- 2. From the end of verse 1 through the end of verse 3, David quotes the kinds of things people say in order to discourage him. How do they tell him to flee?
- 3. What does verse 2 say the wicked are planning to do? Who are their targets?
- 4. What does verse 3 say is being destroyed?
- 5. According to verse 4, where is the Lord? Why is this important?
- 6. What does verse 4 say the Lord sees and does?
- 7. Who does verse 5 say the Lord tests? Who does this verse say God hates?
- 8. What does verse 6 insist the Lord will do to the wicked?
- 9. How does verse 7 describe the Lord? What does David say that God loves?
- 10. What does verse 7 promise that the upright will see? Is this promise important to you?

Summary and Application:

- 1. What kinds of things do you see and hear that discourage you? In such times, how does it help you to remember that God is sovereign over everyone and everything?
- 2. Is it important to you that God is perfectly righteous and just? Why or why not?
- 3. How does this psalm provide a model of the way human rulers should exercise their authority?
