In the Face of Opposition Jeremiah 26:1-24

Review:

- 1. Being faithful to God's Word often gets us in trouble with unbelievers, who try to "cancel" Christians
- 2. Christians should not depend on human governments to protect us
- 3. We are called to trust in the Branch of David, the One Who is our righteousness, the One Who will do justice, the only One Who can ensure our security.

- 15. What does God say He has done to His people because of their sin?
- 16. In verse 15, God summarizes His people's problem. What three reasons does He give for the incurability of their pain?
- 17. What does God promise will happen to those who have devoured His people?
- 18. What will happen to their adversaries?
- 19. What will happen to those who plunder God's people?
- 20. What will happen to those who prey upon God's people?
- 21. In verse 17, what does the Lord promise to do for His people and why?
