## Shepherds for Sheep Mark 6:30-44

## Review:

- 1. Christian leaders must be humble, because our resources are limited and our tasks are beyond our abilities to accomplish
- 2. Our helplessness must lead us to a radical trust in Christ to accomplish His work in us and in others
- 3. Our needs must drive us back to Christ, and then forward to share His blessings with others

## Reflect:

- 1. In what aspects of your life have you been called to lead? How effective do you think your leadership has been? How can you lead others in a more Christlike way?
- 2. In what ways do you need to follow the teaching and example of your deacons and elders more consistently? Ask God for the grace to follow them as they follow Christ.

## Go Further: Read I Peter 5:1-7

- 1. How does Peter describe himself in verse 1? What does he have in common with his readers, and what sets him apart from them?
- 2. What does Peter want the elders to do in verse 2? What are the reasons they should do these things?
- 3. Peter gives a negative and a positive example of Christian leadership in verse 3. How should Christians lead, and how should they not lead?
- 4. What does Peter promise the elders in verse 4?
- 5. What does Peter counsel young men to do in verse 5?
- 6. What attitude does Peter encourage all of us to have in verse 6?
- 7. For what two reasons does Peter say we should humble ourselves before God in verses 6 and 7?

Summary and Application:

- 1. What sorts of problems are best handled by a whole congregation? Which might best be entrusted to a few leaders to handle?
- 2. About what sorts of spiritual questions or problems would you be willing to seek the counsel of elders or deacons?
- 3. How does seeking the counsel and oversight of elders express our humility?
- 4. In I Peter 5:7, Peter says we should all humble ourselves toward one another. How might this apply to elders as well as younger church members?
