- 6. In verse 34, what title does Jesus use for Himself? What blessings does He promise to those on His right?
- 7. In verses 35 and 36, why does Jesus say those on His right will receive these blessings?
- 8. In verses 37-39, why do those on Jesus' right appear to be confused?
- 9. In verse 40, whom does Jesus say those on His right have helped? What is His relationship with those who have been helped?
- 10. In verse 41, what curses does Jesus promise to those on His left?
- 11. Why does Jesus say in verses 42-43 that those on His left will receive these curses?
- 12. In verse 44, why do those on Jesus' left appear to be confused?
- 13. In verse 45, Jesus condemns failure to help others. What is His relationship with those who have not been helped?
- 14. In verse 46, where does Jesus say those on His left will go? Where does Jesus say those on His right will go?
