## Receive One Another Romans 15:1-13

## Review:

- 1. Whenever we have a disagreement with Christian brothers and sisters, we follow Jesus' example, not seeking to get our own way, but seeking the good of others.
- 2. We must not be satisfied to help others at arm's length, but must welcome others, just as Christ received us in spite of our sins.
- 3. In His ministry to the Jews, Christ showed God's truth and faithfulness, and in His ministry to the Gentiles, Christ showed God's mercy
- 4. Christ's intention for His Church is to join people from every culture in praise and worship of God.

## Go Further: Read Isaiah 11:1-10

- 1. In verse 1, Isaiah describes the Messiah as a shoot from the stem of Jesse. Since Jesse was King David's father, what promise does this fulfill (see II Samuel 7:16)? Why is it so important that God kept this promise to David?
- 2. In verse 2, how does God say the Spirit will equip His Messiah?
- 3. What does God say in verse 3 about the Messiah's motivation?
- 4. How does God describe the way the Messiah will administer justice in verse 4?
- 5. With what two things does God say the Messiah will clothe Himself in verse 5? What does this "clothing" tell us about Him?
- 6. Verses 6 through 8 describe a radical change in the way human beings relate to animals, and the first part of verse 9 summarizes this. What does this description tell us about the Messiah's Kingdom?
- 7. What does the second part of verse 9 tell us about how the Messiah will change the earth? How does this relate to the Gentiles coming to faith in Christ?
- 8. What does God say the Gentiles or the nations will do in verse 10? To what does God compare His Messiah in this verse?

## Apply:

- 1. In our disagreements with others, how can we show both truth and mercy?
- 2. How can we participate in God's plan to draw all the nations of the world to Himself?
- 3. In our own lives, how can we demonstrate the character of the Messiah that we see described in this passage?
